

Tax Tips 2005 for Child Care Providers and Parents

From January through April, Customer Service Representatives at the Division of Child Development receive telephone calls from child care providers and parents with questions regarding tax preparations. Below are the most frequently asked questions. Listed under these questions are helpful links to provide resources and information to child care providers and parents.

“My child attends a family child care home and I need to obtain a tax identification number to file on my taxes.”

“How can I obtain a tax identification number if my child care provider refuses to furnish a tax identification number?”

“I am a non-licensed child care provider and only care for two children. Am I responsible for reporting my income and to whom should I report this information?”

“My child care provider accepts cash for my child care tuition but does not provide receipts.”

“My child care provider refused to provide me with her social security number. Can I still claim what I paid for child care on my taxes while I worked?”

“How do I file my taxes if my child care provider has terminated the child care business without giving me a tax identification number and/or did not provide receipts?”

Note: A child care provider who participates and receives payment from North Carolina’s Subsidized Child Care Program has agreed to provide parents with a receipt, which should include the dates and services covered, for parental fees as they are paid.

“Is the facility identification number the same as a tax identification number?”

- No, if you operate your child care business as a sole proprietorship and have no employees, you will use your own social security number on tax forms and receipts. If you employ anyone, or if the business is organized as a partnership or corporation, you will need to obtain an Employer Identification Number (EIN) to use in filing tax and information returns on receipts you give to parents for their fees. To apply for an EIN, use Form S S-4 available from Social Security Administration or Internal Revenue Service offices. If you operate a non-profit organization or church and you do not have an EIN, the words “tax-exempt” can be substituted for the tax payer identification number.
